Accessing the COVID-19 Vaccine



Living with multiple sclerosis comes with a lot of uncertainty — but one thing you should not feel uncertain about is how to access the COVID-19 vaccine. Below is a quick guide to accessing the COVID-19 vaccine — covering everything from costs to finding a vaccination site.

Vaccine Eligibility

As of now, all 50 states and the District of Columbia have opened vaccine eligibility for all adults (18+). The CDC has authorized the use of the Pfizer-BioNtech vaccine for **adolescents 5 and older.**

Find a Vaccination Site

There are two simple ways to find a vaccination site near you:

Visit VaccineFinder

Recommended by the CDC, enter your zip code to find a vaccination site near you. Once you have found an available site, you will need to schedule an appointment directly through the vaccine site/provider.

Visit your local state health department website

We have linked to all COVID-19 resource pages for each state and the District of Columbia below. Pages include information on vaccine eligibility and locating vaccination sites, including information on mass vaccination sites if your state offers them.

Vaccine Costs

Regardless of your immigration status or health insurance coverage, **COVID-19 vaccination providers cannot charge you for the vaccine or any service/fee related to receiving the vaccine.** Vaccine providers cannot:

- Refuse to give you the vaccine, even if you are out-of-network, uninsured or underinsured
- Charge you for any copays, coinsurance or administration/office visit fees if the only service you received was a COVID-19 vaccination
- Require you to get additional services in order to get the vaccine

If you are insured, COVID-19 vaccination providers can get reimbursement from your plan or program (e.g., Medicare, private health insurance), but they cannot charge you the balance.

Johnson & Johnson vs. mRNA Vaccines

Any of the three vaccines approved or authorized for your age are safe for people living with MS. However, the CDC now recommends the mRNA vaccines over the Johnson & Johnson vaccine. People with MS should select the Pfizer or Moderna vaccine when getting vaccinated.
